


We will have lunch in Fellowship Hall following the meeting, prepared and served by the Executive Council. Reservations are needed. Please sign up so we have enough for everyone.

This month I am sharing a piece written by **Rev. Dr. H. D. Gray**, for an "About Congregationalism" pamphlet published by the NACCC.

My Church ***By Henry David Gray***



My Church is not a building, although it often meets therein. It is not an organization, although it is well organized. It is not a company of people who hold to a particular set of beliefs, although it stands for great convictions. It is not a respectable community club, although it is a powerful factor in community life.

My Church is a fellowship of kindred spirits. Its members are united by a great conviction and a great purpose; the conviction that God is eager to share the road of life with us; the purpose to build personal character after the pattern of Jesus, and community life more like unto the Kingdom of God. Because we share this conviction and this purpose, our Church is a growing Church.

My Church is a living Church. It places the emphasis where Jesus placed it; on ministering unto others and in daily living. "So live that you may best work" is its motto. It is a Church which values the past and dreams of the future, but a church which lives in the present.

My Church is a thinking Church. It asks no ready assent to creed or catechism. It is a Church of the seeking mind, looking ever for the truth which God shall yet disclose through worship, art, literature, or science.

My Church is a Church of the spirit. It puts people first: before programs, committees, or things material. It is a Church which seeks to know the highest, and then humbly but fearlessly follows the light as God gives it to see the light.

My Church is the Church of my dreams, wrought into the fabric of life by the deeds of its members.

CHILDREN AND COMMUNION – FEBRUARY 3



From Rev. Mimi Biedron:

How old should a child be to take communion? This question has come up recently at North Church, and was the subject of a great discussion at the meeting of our Diaconate in January. Congregationalism as a tradition has always observed open communion: there are no prerequisites of age, baptism, church membership, or formal profession of faith for a person to partake. This has also meant that there is no formal way for children to celebrate "first communion." Our practice has been to encourage parents to talk about this with their children, and mutually decide when the child can let his or her faith be the guide to partaking.

An important point that emerged in the discussion was the observation that children learn by watching their parents and other adults do things; when we have celebrated communion, our children have already left the sanctuary to go to Sunday School. And so, the Diaconate has determined that on Sunday, February 3, our next communion, we will move the ritual of the Lord's Supper to the early part of the worship service, BEFORE children leave for class. On this first occasion, a children's message will introduce the idea and share what the children may do during communion; parents can then encourage their children to either watch or partake, and can also talk with their children after worship about the Lord's Supper, what they saw, and what it means.

As Congregationalists, we do NOT believe that the elements are transformed into actual body and blood; rather they stand for the body and blood enabling us, through sharing in communion, to be the body of Christ, redeemed by Christ's blood for the sake of the world. The sacredness of communion, one of only two sacraments in our tradition (the other is baptism) is in the community it forms and strengthens. So, remember: **ON SUNDAY, FEBRUARY 3, SUNDAY SCHOOL STUDENTS WILL REMAIN IN THE SANCTUARY AT THE SECOND HYMN, THROUGH COMMUNION, AND THEN LEAVE DURING THE HYMN AT THE END OF COMMUNION.**

Most of all, our Congregational Way means we seek to understand others who have other viewpoints. We value consensus in our decisions which I have seen lead to fair resolutions to difficult problems and also unearthed novel approaches.

These skills, along with prayer, are going to be needed even more in 2019. Mr. Rogers has a smart mother whose advice I have adopted. *When life feels scary, be a helper. If I cannot be a helper, find a way to help the helpers*, (which is pretty much the moderator job description).

Working together to make the world a better place is the beauty of a faith community like ours.

CROSSROADS Sunday, February 10

I was recently reading an article, and came across a quote by Robert Byne: "The purpose of life is a life of purpose". This quote made me think of North Church, and our relationship with Crossroads. **We will be going to Crossroads Soup Kitchen on February 10th, and serving a warm and nutritious meal to over 500 people.** You can help in many ways. First and foremost, know that money you have given to North Congregational Church in your yearly pledge, or on Sundays in the collection plate, will be used to purchase about \$1500 worth of groceries for the lunch we will prepare. **Our menu will consist of turkey noodle soup, roast beef and turkey sandwiches, bananas, coffee, lemonade and best of all - homemade cookies from you!**

Please bring your cookies to church after February 1st, and place them in the freezer. If you are going to bring them to church on February 10th, we will have someone to bring those cookies to us working at the soup kitchen that day.

Also, if you have any hotel toiletries, or extra soaps, shampoos, conditioners, toothbrushes, toothpastes, etc., around your house, please bring them in to church. We will have the PF make hygiene kits to be distributed to those in need.

Additionally, if you have cleaned out your closets recently, and find **gently used coats, hats, mittens, scarfs, boots, or any warm item of clothing**, please consider bringing those in to church also and

placing them in the mission room. We will be taking down any clothing brought to church, and distributing it to the clients that day.

We will be working in tandem with the Muslim Community Mosque. They have joined us for the past few years in serving at Crossroads. **Sister Elizabeth Walters** (the soup kitchen manager) has often commented to me, on how special our two groups working together is for her and the community. I feel this is another "purpose" we have experienced with our relationship of serving at Crossroads. One of the mothers from the Mosque recently told me that her son overwhelmingly felt that he needed to come work at the soup kitchen again. She said her son was extremely touched by the fact that there were children his age, coming to the soup kitchen in order to be fed. I think that sense of purpose can be felt through the cultures and generations we experience every day.

Please sign up to work the morning or afternoon shift, and/or sign up to make cookies. Please bring in toiletries and place them in the table in the Link, and warm clothing items may be taken to the Missions room. **Please know that you have made a difference** in many lives by participating at Crossroads Soup Kitchen, in whatever way you do! Since 2006, SBP has directly rebuilt homes for more than 1,300 families with the help of more than 180,000 volunteers in New Orleans and other disaster-stricken communities around America. 

The shawl maker begins with prayers and blessings for the recipient. The intentions are continued throughout the creation of the shawl. Upon completion, a final blessing is offered before the shawl is sent on its way. Some recipients have continued the kindness by making a shawl and passing it onto someone in need. Thus, the blessing ripples from person-to-person, with both the giver and receiver feeling the unconditional embrace of a sheltering, mothering God!

Shawls are given out when someone is undergoing a medical procedure; as a comfort after a loss or in times of stress; during bereavement; for prayer or meditation; during an illness and recovery, when she is having a baby, for a wedding or baby shower, or ministering to others.

The National Association of Congregational Christian Churches (NACCC) holds its annual meeting each summer to conduct the business of the association. Usually concurrent with that is a national gathering of Pilgrim Fellowship students from around the country. The National Association of Pilgrim Fellowship (NAPF) and Heritage of Pilgrim Endeavor (HOPE) youth meet for fellowship, spiritual growth and inspiration, and for mission work. The bonds of friendship that form endure for many years over many miles.

NAPF is for youth who are entering the 9th through 12th grades. NAPF allows teens to meet and bond with other Christians from throughout the country and to share their faith in a fun-filled atmosphere. Small groups are led by dedicated adult counselors. Opportunities to express faith through acts of service are always a highlight of the conference. Any time a group of young people is gathered, there is always plenty of fun.

HOPE offers young adults post high school through age 26 a great opportunity to further grow in faith with peers in an environment similar to NAPF. While still including worship, speakers, small group time, and mission work, HOPE promotes closer connection with peers and deeper discussion about faith through peer-led small groups. In addition, HOPE

provides more opportunities for leadership involvement. HOPE creates a genuine, meaningful, and fun atmosphere to grow in faith while creating new friendships.

Transportation - Michigan Pilgrim Fellowship (<http://michiganpf.org/>) is organizing a transportation package to and from NAPF/HOPE for the meeting. More information will be available once the details are finalized.

Financial Assistance
North Congregational Church's Youth Restricted Fund will contribute one half of the \$450.00 NAPF/HOPE registration costs and one half of the MiPF transportation package costs (regardless of whether the youth travels with MiPF).

There are also two scholarships available through the NACCC: the Youth Fund for NAPF and HOPE Scholarship and the Levi Matthew Putnam Memorial Day Scholarship. Both scholarships provide assistance to anyone wishing to attend NAPF or HOPE who has financial need and has shown outstanding participation in local church youth programs and/or community service.
