From the Minister...

April begins with events that lie at the very heart of our faith as followers of Jesus: Maundy Thursday (April 1), when we remember Jesus in the breaking of the bread and the pouring of the cup of the new covenant to love one another; Good Friday (April 2) when we once again live through the horror of Jesus' trial and crucifixion, signs of the how the world confronts the message of love and rejects the presence of the Kingdom of God, and concludes with Easter Sunday (April 4) as we discover that nothing and nobody – not even death—can prevent Christ from bursting forth in life, can prevent the Kingdom of God from breaking into the world.

This year, these themes are perhaps more pointed than usual: we have lived through more than a year with the global pandemic, and even as vaccines are being administered, the future still seems hazy, our path forward still unclear. It can be hard—and frustrating!—to be unable to plan, and yet, remembering the proclamation that the Kingdom of God is here right now, we are called upon to walk in faith.

Part of that walking in faith is planning to return to in-church worship, even as the online service continues (though at a different time, later on Sunday afternoons). Currently, that's planned for **April 18 at 10:30 a.m.**, depending on stabilization of the case rate. It will be very different – there is no "normal" anymore – with social distancing, masks, no coffee hour or social time, no singing, no choir, no music. Even so, God will be present among us, both gathered in person and gathered on the internet, just as God has been most present as we've been walking through the valley of the shadow of death all year. So please do join us as we continue to seek ways to love and serve God by loving and serving God's people – and the whole world.

I am writing this on the Friday before Palm Sunday. We look ahead to Holy Week, to a renewal of spirit and hope. I trust you and your families will take the time to celebrate Easter and reflect on all it means to us today.

We are looking ahead to the day when we can resume worship in our building. To that end, we have a survey under way to ascertain the Congregation's views on this. If you have not completed it yet, please take a moment to do so (it's very short). You can find the survey at:

In addition to the survey, the Reopening Task Team and Executive Council have been working on the procedures we will follow when we do return to in-person worship. We will proceed cautiously. Initially masks will be required, we will not have the Choir or singing, seating will be spaced out, and there will be no coffee hour. As the pandemic in our area recedes we return to our normal worship routine. We post a summary dashboard on the Church website of the pandemic status, you can find it under "Members' Corner / Covid-19 Info".

Through all this, the work of the Church continues. Rev. Biedron continues her virtual Sunday worship and Wednesday inspiration series. We continue to support charities such as Crossroads and other benevolences. Our Mission Boards continue to meet and do God's work.

Executive Council Notes

Executive Council met on March 22 and considered the following:

- Assets & Resources: This Board is reviewing possible investments in our building HVAC systems, against our return. The Board approved contracts for spring landscaping and yard work.
 - Please complete and submit your pledges for 2021, either via mail-in card or on the Church website. This is vital input into our budgeting for this year.
- <u>Diaconate</u>: The Diaconate reported preparations for our March 27 pre-Palm Sunday parking lot event.
- Education: Our Education Board continues to gain experience with the new Sunday School curriculum materials we recently obtained; the results thus far have been positive. The Education Board also reported that they are preparing craft packets and an Easter egg hunt for our parking March 27 lot event.
- <u>Fellowship:</u> The Fellowship Board held a virtual trivia event that was fun and successful. They are working on developing a Movie Club, analogous to our book club. They are also planning

other virtual social events (such as a euchre tournament). If you have suggestions for social events, please let them know! This Board also reported the preparations they are making for our March 27 parking lot event.



- <u>Missions:</u> Our Missions Board organized North Church participation in Crossroads (downtown Detroit) on March 14. Looking ahead, the Board is working on providing hand-out kits for women who are Crossroads clients.
- Worship: The Worship Board reported their work on preparations for our March 27 parking lot event and for Holy Week.
- <u>Treasurer:</u> North Church has been approved for a second PPP loan from the Federal government. We have received the \$45,000 loan; like the first such loan, we expect this to be forgiven at some point.

• New Business:

O As noted earlier, our 2021 Program Meeting will be **June 27**. It is normally in May, but since it was delayed to September last year this gives the current Board members a bit more time in office. Looking ahead to this meeting, Council launched a Nominating subcommittee to recommend candidates for open Board positions. <u>If you are interested in serving on one of our Ministry Boards, please let the Board Chair know.</u>

COVID-19 GIVING OPTIONS

There are two options if you wish to keep up with your church donations while we wait for the building to reopen and worship services to resume.

You may make donations by mailing checks, made out to North Congregational, to **Danny Hawkins** at the church where Danny is picking up his mail at least twice a week.

You may also consider the North Congregational Church electronic option for making ongoing, one time and special offerings. Contributions can be debited automatically from your bank account or processed using your credit card (with a 2.6% fee charged to the church). Our electronic giving program offers convenience for you and donation consistency for our congregation. If you are currently giving on a weekly basis, you will no longer need to write 52 checks a year or prepare 52 envelopes. And, when travel, illness, global pandemic or other circumstances prevent you from attending worship services, this program will allow your weekly offerings to continue on an uninterrupted basis.

CROSSROADS UPDATE...from Sara and Steve Lange

Greetings! Thank you to everyone who participated in making Sunday 3/14 a great day for those in need at Crossroads Soup Kitchen. We served 340 clients a tasty lunch of freshly made chili, 2 hotdogs on buns with all the fixings, banana, lemonade, bottled water, coffee and finished off with your delicious homemade cookies. Kudos to the onion choppers for their difficult job! Hygiene kits were made by many of you, containing toothbrushes, toothpaste, soap, razors, shaving creams, lip balms, hand sanitizers, and gratefully received by those in the lunch line. There were volunteers outside in the parking lot assisting clients to receive donated coats, jeans, shoes, socks and plarn mats. Your efforts truly touched many of the neediest in Detroit, giving them a hand up and the gift of hope.

North Congregational Church has been a friend of Crossroads for over 35 years, and we've been working at the soup kitchen frequently during the pandemic. On October 25,2020, NCC came to Crossroads to serve a freshly made lunch. Many organizations during this time were finding it difficult to procure enough volunteers to serve lunch, let alone make lunch for the clients. Some

North Congregational Sundays the staff at Crossroads were the only people working to serve pre-made meals (pizza, KFC, etc.). The staff at Crossroads felt very dedicated to keeping the soup kitchen open every Sunday, and we helped! Volunteers from NCC staffed the soup kitchen on December 20, 2020, providing a warm meal and welcoming smile to those waiting in the snow for their lunch. On January 24,2021 we sent down the hats, mittens,



scarves and warm weather donations that the Women's Fellowship collected through the Sock Project and the Knitting Tree. Some of you helped work outside prior to the snow squall, distributing these essential warm clothes to the homeless and needy. That particular day, we had about 9 homeless men show up early, eager to find clean clothes and blankets to keep them warm. Many Sundays, members of our congregation are working down at Crossroads serving lunches, making condiment packets and helping in whatever way they can on their own time.

These are unprecedented times, but the generosity and effort shown to Crossroads by the members of North Congregational Church has been exceptional during these difficult days. Sister Liz was telling me on Sunday that they will still be serving the clients their lunch via an open door, keeping them out of the lunchroom for now. There are plans to put up tables and chairs in the parking lot, socially distanced, allowing the clients to have a seat to eat their lunch this spring. As everywhere, things are continuing to change at Crossroads. Stay tuned for more volunteer opportunities!

CROP WALK IS HERE!

Have you been dismayed seeing the long lines of cars waiting for food during the pandemic, as well as in natural disasters such as the fires in California or the deep freeze in the south? Did your heart break at the sight of starving children in Yemen on the news? Have you wished that there is something you could do to help? You can do this: support the CROP Hunger Walk, which raises funds for hunger relief. North Church has been involved with the Farmington/Farmington Hills/West Bloomfield Crop walk since we came to this community, and **Rev. Biedron** has been the general chair of the Walk since 1999.

Our 2021 annual CROP Hunger Walk to raise funds for global and local hunger relief will kick off on May 2, with a car rally at 1:30 pm (location TBD). Our fundraising has moved to the internet, and we're hoping to have a number of North Church walkers join with churches, mosques and synagogues as well as local agencies to raise funds. Of the total amount raised (generally between \$30,000-\$35,000) 25% will come back to our designated community partners: CARES, Neighborhood House, Salvation Army Farmington Hills



Branch, Yad Ezra Kosher Food Pantry, and Zaman International.
